2021-2025 STRATEGIC PLAN

Launched last fall, Barton College's 2021-2025 Barton Bold and Connected Strategic Plan showcases the ambitious plan for future growth and strategic direction.

In the next five years, Barton will contribute toward North Carolina's statewide "MyFutureNC" initiative of increasing degree credentialing beyond high school by 2030. Barton plans to increase undergraduate enrollment to 1,350, and substantially increase master's degree and online programming by 2025.

In addition, the College aims to be an economic driver in the workforce development efforts in the region. According to the 2020 North Carolina County Attainment Report, Wilson County is projected to have 99,203 job openings between 2017-2026. Barton is at the forefront of providing workforce development education opportunities in training a highly-skilled workforce for Wilson County and beyond.

By focusing on three foundational pillars — radical innovation, pivotal partnerships, and distinctive identity, "Barton Bold and Connected" provides a springboard for an aggressive strategy to further position the College as an economic and regional driver in delivering quality, accessible, affordable, and distinctive academic programs. Barton's new strategic plan aligns the College's mission and strengths to expand its academic offerings to prepare skilled professionals.

We are proud that our work is grounded in the principles of liberal arts, and it is what makes us unique.






With 7 schools, 40+ majors, and 6 graduate programs, we were excited this year to open our classrooms to 1,215 students. We named 88 full-time, undergraduate students to the President's List and 348 full-time, undergraduate students to the Dean's List for spring semester 2022.

President's List students compiled a perfect 4.0 grade point average on a four-point scale, with a minimum of 12 credit hours earning lettered grades; Dean's List students achieved a grade point average of 3.3 or better on a four-point scale, with a minimum of 12 credit hours earning lettered grades.

The work we do came together in a week-long series of events in early April where the campus gathered for Days of Scholarship and Engagement. Day of Scholarship is a tradition at Barton College where we welcome guest researchers; listen to research presentations from students, staff, and faculty; and celebrate our alumni whose research skills, built at Barton, have led them to success. We look forward to expanding on this year's success and including donors in some capacity next year. Stay tuned!



FACULTY SPOTLIGHTS



GÉRARD LANGE, Ed.D.

DIRECTOR OF THE WHITEHURST FAMILY HONORS PROGRAM

As Director of the Whitehurst Family Honors Program, and professor for Department of Art and Design, Dr. Lange had a busy academic year. He completed his Doctorate of Education in Higher Education Leadership, Maryville University, St. Louis, Missouri, August 2021; and he used his funding from the 2019 Lincoln Financial Faculty of the Year award to fund a research project in Cork, Ireland, during the summer of 2021. Through the Cork Historical and Archeological Society, he gained access to documents related to early Irish feminism. Other publications include: Coffee: On Collecting Coffee Cups; Blurb Books (2022); "Celebrating Death," published in The Collegiate, Barton College, May 2022. Dr. Lange had a paper; "Motivators and Inhibitors of Completion in Honors: A Phenomenological Examination of Student Characteristics Compared to Academic and Non-Academic Features." accepted for the 2021 National Collegiate Honors Council Conference: Reimagining Honors in Orlando, Fla. Dr. Lange was also a presenter for "Coffee Chat: Research Methods Primary Sources," Adam Matthew Digital, located in Marlborough, United Kingdom [online for the East Coast Region of the U.S.], April 13, 2022.



DR. LYDIA WALKER, Ph.D.

ASSISTANT PROFESSOR OF HISTORY

In the 2021-2022, Lydia Walker published an article on gender and crusade preaching, "Real Men Preach: Constructions of Clerical Masculinity in the Context of Thirteenth-Century Crusade Preaching," in Gender and Voice in Medieval French Literature and Lyric, edited by Rachel May Golden and Katherine Kong. With the support of Barton's Professional Development Grant and a travel award from the Medieval Academy of America, Dr. Walker presented her recent research on holy women and holy war at the International Medieval Congress in Leeds, UK. She also traveled to Belgium where she examined fourteenth-century manuscripts of medieval sermon materials housed at the KBR, the Royal Library of Belgium in Brussels.

MIGUEL ANGEL ELIZADO PEDROUSO, M.F.A.

ASSISTANT PROFESSOR OF COMMUNICATIONS

Miguel Elizado recently presented a paper at the 2021 International Digital Media and Arts Association (iDMAa) Conference titled "Where does this sound come from?" in which he shared the challenge of creating sound maps in China. This sound project was a collaborative student project for one of his courses during his time as Assistant Professor of Media Arts at United International College, Beijing Normal University-Hong Kong Baptist University. The process used a Chinese social media platform, WeChat, for the recording and sharing of the sound files and their metadata and Google Maps for the creation of the sound map. In January 2022, Elizalde presented "Grounding Whispers Infrasound Recordings of Wilson," in the Barton Art Galleries.



MICHAEL F. BRANTLEY, M.F.A

ASSISTANT PROFESSOR OF COMMUNICATIONS

Michael Brantley continues to publish in the field of creative writing. This past year, Brantley published the "No More to the Lake" essay in Broad River Review [Fall 2021], and was a Writer in Residence at the Weymouth Center for the Humanities of NC, as he began a new biography of a War of 1812 privateer in the Norfolk/Newport News area – the manuscript is currently under review. He signed a contract for a book of essays about the South, [to be published in spring of 2023]. Brantley published several freelance stories and music reviews in Bluegrass Unlimited, his "Homeplace" essay was published in the Museum of Americana [Summer 2022], and he published 52 columns in The Nashville Graphic.



RODNEY A. WERLINE, Ph.D.


DEAN OF HOWARD CHAPEL AND LEMAN AND MARIE BARNHILL ENDOWED CHAIR IN RELIGIOUS STUDIES



After publishing books in 2020 and 2021, Dr. Rodney A. Werline, Dean of Howard Chapel and the Leman and Marie Barnhill Endowed Chair in Religious Studies, has turned his attention to completing a book on ritual in the Bible for Westminster John Knox Press and working on a large project titled Prayer in the Ancient World. On the prayer project, he serves as co-general editor with Dr. Daniel Falk (Penn State University), with Dr. Jen Singletary (Penn State University), and providing special editorial assistance. The project will include examples and discussions of every type of prayer from the begining of civilization to the early decades of Islam. About ten area editors from around the world work under the direction of Dr. Werline and Dr. Falk, with some of the world's best scholars contributing entries. Brill Publishing (Leiden), one of the world's oldest and most prestigious academic presses, will publish the work in both an online and print format. When completed, the print edition will contain about two million words in three large volumes.







ATHLETICS

THE SPIRIT OF SPORT

Team spirit and fan loyalty can infect a college campus and a community, and Barton College, along with the City of Wilson, felt that energy this past year. Adding Football to Barton's campus was a wonderful way to knit together the Barton community and Wilson at-large, and we saw that community love of the Bulldogs come out in spades. Additionally, the Bulldogs ranked high across the Conference:

- The women's basketball team had one of their best seasons in school history, finishing with a 28-2 record, including a 20-1 mark in Conference Carolinas play on their way to capturing both the league regular season and tournament championships. Barton also advanced to the NCAA Division II Southeast Regional Tournament.
- Barton also had a pair of NCAA Division II All-Americans in seniors Shanika Peterkin (Virginia Beach, Va.) in women's basketball and Bryson Boyette (Wilson, N.C.) in men's golf.
- In one of the most anticipated arrivals in Barton's athletic history, the Bulldogs' football team played their first full season in fall 2021. Barton turned a lot of heads with a winning season at 6-5, including several milestone victories such as a 26-20 overtime home win over then-No. 8 Wingate.
- In the classroom, a total of 309 Barton student-athletes were named to the Conference Carolinas Spring 2002 Presidential Honor Roll.







- The Homecoming game against Bluefield State was the highest attended game of the fall 2021 season, bringing in 3,075 spectators and an overwhelming Barton victory of 62-7. We were excited to open our doors last fall to a number of performances and visual arts in the Kennedy Family Theatre and the Barton Art Galleries.

The Theatre at Barton presented two productions last year: Nightfall with Edgar Allan Poe by Eric Coble in the fall and Five Hundred Nights in the Theatre: Full Circle, a musical production in honor of retiring Maestro Mark Peterson, celebrating his 21-year tenure as Barton College's Director of Music.

The Barton Art Galleries presented a number of exhibitions, welcoming visiting artists and Artists-in-Residence throughout the year.

All exhibitions take place during the academic year and are open and free to the public. Gallery exhibitions and lecture series are funded in part by the Virginia Thompson Graves Gallery Endowment and the Friends of Visual Arts Endowment and FOVA members.

Finally, the Barton / Wilson Symphony Orchestra performed Fall and Spring concerts, as well as the traditional Love the Symphony event on February 14, presenting BlueGrass and Symphony: a collaboration with Balsam Range, which provided a stellar experience for those all attendance.

Our donors have an opportunity to support students by establishing an endowed scholarship, creating a permanent, self-sustaining fund that provides funds annually to students.


Each year a portion of the endowment's earnings are distributed for the donor's chosen purpose, while the corpus continues to grow in perpetuity. The permanence of such a gift is powerful. This past year, our endowed scholarships were able to support 322 students, 28% of our undergraduates. The impacts of scholarships are as diverse as the students themselves. PARTNERSHIPS TO FILL GAPS AND LEAD THE WAY

BARTON COLLEGE AND AREA LAHEC

This past year, Barton College joined forces with the North Carolina Area Health Education Centers, Area L AHEC to launch a new virtual clinical experience addressing the impacts of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) and trauma on individuals and communities — a first for North Carolina.

In response to COVID-19, Area LAHEC and Barton College partnered to create online modules that could substitute in-person student clinical experiences. They enlisted the help of Rural Opportunity Institute and 14 of its Certified Resilience Educators to film and produce a module focused on trauma awareness, which is part of NC AHEC's virtual training program, made available through each of the state's nine AHECs covering all 100 counties.

"I am so proud to be a part of increasing ACES awareness through this online platform for students in the health field," says Tyra Hilliard, Partner Relations Coordinator at Rural Opportunity Institute. "By increasing awareness of the impact of childhood trauma, we can start to decrease the incorrect diagnoses of ADHD and ADD by considering ACEs while searching for the root cause of behavioral issues."

"When planning the Adverse Childhood Experiences or ACEs' module, we turned to ROI given their expertise in training trauma-informed community members," explains Dr. Susan Bane, associate professor of allied health and sport studies and physician. "Their collaboration has been vital to the success of this module and has provided the students with the opportunity to see how each of us should care for others through a trauma-informed lens — being sensitive to the impact of trauma on others and ourselves."



This past academic year Barton College was recognized for its honorable commitment to engaged, hands-on education by Colleges of Distinction, a one-of-a-kind guide for college-bound students. As an institution whose primary goals are based on student success and satisfaction, Barton College claims its honor as one of the renowned Colleges of Distinction. Barton was also named as a North Carolina College of Distinction.

Colleges of Distinction's longstanding support for student-centered schools highlight those that traditional rankings often overlook. Founder Wes Creel created Colleges of Distinction to draw more attention to schools like Barton College whose student-centered education prevails in applying theory to practice while fostering a dynamic learning community.

Colleges of Distinction's selection process comprises a sequence of in-depth research and detailed interviews with the schools about each institution's freshman experience and retention efforts alongside its general education programs, career development, strategic plan, student satisfaction, and more — and accepting only those that adhere to the Four Distinctions: Engaged Students, Great Teaching, Vibrant Community, and Successful Outcomes. These principles are all informed by the High-Impact Practices to prioritize the ways that institutions enable students to have a fulfilling, individualized college experience.

Every student has their own unique set of abilities, their own goals, and their own ideal settings in which they would thrive," said Creel. "That's why we don't rank our schools. It's about finding the best opportunities for each individual's needs and desires." Barton College's inclusion is informed by the unique ways it commits to achieving success.

RANKINGS

MAKING OUR **MARK**

Barton College was recognized again this past year as the highest ranked North Carolina school in the 2022 U.S. News & World Report's listing of "Best Value" Schools Among Regional Colleges in the South, with its #8 ranking in this category.

Among U.S. News & World Report's 2022 "Best Undergraduate Teaching" Among Regional Colleges in the South, Barton climbed to #6 this past year, and the College also jumped to #6 this past year as a top performer on "Social Mobility" among Regional Colleges in the South.

Barton also continued to hold a distinctive position at #14 in the 2022 U.S. News & World Report's overall rankings of the Best Regional Colleges in the South.

And, once again, Barton College was named as one of 143 colleges listed in The Princeton Review's 2022 list of "Best Southeastern" regional colleges. Princeton Review does not rank by number.


